

A QUESTION I get asked at every party when meeting new people is, "So where is your favourite place in the world"?

It's such a hard question to answer, as obviously that totally depends on what type of holiday you seek, who you're going with, time of year, etc.

But when pushed to the limit, nine times out of 10 I come back to Tuscany. Why? Because it offers in abundance all the things I love: a rich history and vibrant culture, amazing architecture, sunshine, fabulous food and wine, art and music, and lovely people. The landscape is just so beautiful you can't help but fall under its spell.

In September last year a group of friends, my husband and I rented a villa there for a house-party to celebrate some milestone anniversaries, and I have to say that was about as close to paradise as it gets.

We staved at a villa run by

Merrion Charles (see merrioncharles.com) — a British travel consultant living in Tuscany with an encyclopaedic knowledge of that region and who offers superb villas all over Italy, but with especially wonderful ones in the stunning Val d'Orcia in southern Tuscany, where we chose to locate.

The reason for that was clear to our group from the time they opened the windows in the morning — it is just so totally unspoilt — not surprising as the whole valley is listed as a UNESCO World Heritage

The landscape's distinctive features are flat chalk plains out of which rise almost conical hills with fortified settlements on top — a terrain that has inspired countless artists.

Ūnspoilt Renaissance hilltop villages and towns such as Pienza, Monticchiello and Montepulciano are truly magical to visit. 15th Century churches, palaces, wine cellars, cheese shops, quality linen and leather shops — this is the Tuscany of

your dreams. It's hard to choose one favourite but Pienza would have to be mine. The 1459 Palazzo here was the summer residence of Pope Pius 11, and is part of the monumental complex that includes the Cathedral and Square. No matter where you turn in these towns you are surrounded by sheer unadulterated beauty.

Siena, Perugia, Assisi and Florence are also within striking distance.


While the Val d'Orcia is a feast for your eyes, as our group found, staying in one of these catered villas is also a feast for your tastebuds. It'd be hard to make bad food with the fabulous fresh ingredients on offer in Tuscany (and let's not forget the excellent Chianti and other wines), but our resident cook Ivana excelled to such an extent that none of us went out for one

restaurant dinner. Why would you when she was producing sumptuous three course meals such as, to take one menu. mushroom risotto, wild boar casserole and Tiramisu for around £20 a head (with so much left over your lunch next day was taken care of).

Each dinner ended in a round of applause for her work, and the night we asked Luigi (who helped her) for pizza baked in the villa's own stone-bake outdoor oven, one of our group an American who's a real gourmet — declared it the best pizza of his life.

I wouldn't disagree. Equally the Spaghetti Carbonara, T-Bone steaks on the outdoor BBQ and the panna cotta were eye-wateringly good.

Just chilling by the 20m infinity pool, overlooking fields, an olive grove and a 15th Century



bliss. Everyone commented that this was the most special place they had ever been

— praise indeed for a multi-national group of very experienced travellers.

Pre-dinner drinks taken in the hot tub surrounded by the immaculate vegetable garden and listening to The Godfather theme tune was also much favoured as a pastime.

If you get a good group together there is just nothing like a villa holiday. The staff at these villas are excellent and won't let you lift a finger. No bed making, no shopping for supplies, no cooking, they take instructions, you choose your menus, and, if you wish them to. they do the rest at very reasonable cost. Giorgio Miani's family own four out of the 14 villas in this area marketed by Merrion Charles. They are all meticulously restored and. as Ilaria, his wife, is a famous Italian interior designer, they are furnished with impeccable taste. Whether you have

On one day we tore ourselves away to Agricola Fontanelle — a nearby 50 hectare farm worked by three brothers who each specialise in a different product (wine, olive oil and Sieness (Cinta) — delicious ent product (wine, olive oil and Sienese 'Cinta' — delicious organic pork). They offer a three-hour tour with an English-speaking guide explaining all about it, followed at the end with a wine tasting and a lunch at their home, all for £40. They only take one group at a time only take one group at a time so there's no bus-tour mental-_ this is custom-made for your needs, and a delightful way to get in touch with the countryside it is too.

If you're keen on this area (and how could you not be?) and have a large group, take a look at Villa Tombolino. A vast terrace surrounds the villa with several pergolas, patios and roofed dining areas from where one can enjoy 360° views of the valley and beyond.

With two living rooms and a dining room downstairs, and

ample space for guests to relax, and for anyone who enjoys visiting Tuscany in the cooler months then two of the living rooms have open fireplaces in addition to underfloor heating throughout. All of the bedrooms are spacious and indi-vidually styled exceptionally comfortable beds.

This house sleeps 18. Prices from £6530 a week, but considering that's around £362 a head, that is remarkable value for the quality on offer.



6.5m more tourists are expected in the UK this year compared to 2011 and many will be looking for shortterm private rental accommodation.

Those offering spare rooms for short-term let earned on average

£37 a night in 2011.

1 in 25 Brits have let out a spare room to help pay for a holiday abroad this year and by renting out a spare room for just 22 nights a year you can generate enough revenue to cover the cost of the average British holiday, according to research from travel accommodation website, WhereToSleep.co.uk.

Average rates were £43 per night at the peak of summer 2011 when demand was at its highest. A recent survey of more than 2000 people showed that we Brits spend £836 on

the average holiday.
The majority of us (53%) use savings to cover the cost but with the day-to-day cost of living so high and interest rates so low saving can be a struggle.

Those who decided to rent out their entire property to holiday makers earned an average of £73 per night — £140 a night at the height of summer.
